



The Great Reset

How the U.S. economy will re-start itself after years of excess and mismanagement

Is it possible that the economic crisis might actually turn out to be a good thing? According to Richard Florida, author of *The Rise of the Creative Class*, it just might be. Based on an analysis of the United States economy in the wake of past downturns such as the Great Depression or the 19th-century Long Depression, Florida



argues that we are poised for what he terms a "Great Reset" which could potentially reconfigure the entire U.S. economic infrastructure, from the way we approach home ownership to public transportation. The editor of Wired magazine called *The Great Reset* "must reading for anyone who wants to understand where we are now and where we are <u>headed</u>," and is a breath of fresh air for anyone hoping that Americans (and economists) will learn from their past mistakes.
